

## Biographies of CISDL Climate Law Team

**Mr. Christopher Tung (Hong Kong)**, LLB & LLM (London) is a lead counsel for Climate Change at the CISDL, and a partner in the Hong Kong office of Mallesons Stephen Jaques. He is a solicitor of the Supreme Court of England and Wales and the High Court of Hong Kong, and specialises in projects, environmental and renewable energy work. Mr. Tung assists project participants and investors with legal compliance, risk assessments and documentation in major building and infrastructure projects around Asia. This work involves advice on compliance with environmental impact assessment procedures, environmental regulatory risk and the management of that risk. Increasingly, this work involves climate change and sustainable development issues, and the assessment of risks and barriers associated with renewable energy projects. Mr. Tung is actively involved in environmental and sustainable development initiatives of the Hong Kong business community, and recently completed a submission to the Hong Kong Council for Sustainable Development on a sustainable development strategy for Hong Kong. He is the current Chair of the Sustainable Development Committee of the French Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong. His key area of interest and research is sustainable climate change law. He is presently studying the capacity of international climate change law to accelerate the use of renewable energy, emissions control and emissions trading mechanisms to reduce emissions, improve air quality and promote sustainable development in China.

**Dr. Charlotte Streck (Germany)**, Ph.D. (Humboldt, Berlin), MSc (Regensburg / Freiburg im Breisgau), is Legal Research Fellow of the CISDL, and Director of Climate Focus, BV, an international climate change law and policy consulting firm. **Prof. W. Bradnee Chambers** is a Senior Research Fellow at the CISDL. He is a Senior Programme Officer of the United Nations University / Institute of Advanced Studies, as well as the Coordinator of the Multilateralism and Sustainable Development Programme at UNU/IAS. Before working at UNU/IAS, he worked at UNCTAD in the Transnational Corporation Division, where he researched and wrote chapters on National Legislation and the Regulations Relating to Transnational Corporations. He joined the UNU/IAS in 1996 where he has performed an array of different tasks and positions such as legal advisor, research associate, associate fellow, research fellow, coordinator of the UNU/IAS PhD and Postdoctoral Fellowship Programme and secretary of the UNU/IAS Board. Chambers has also participated in a number of diplomatic, academic and international conferences including Conference of the Parties and Subsidiary Body Meetings for FCCC and CBD, WTO Ministerials, and CSD. He is specialised in public international law and international relations and works on environmental treaty and international economic legal issues. In addition to his responsibilities at UNU/IAS, Chambers is a Convening Lead Author in the Millennium Ecosystem Assessment. Chambers' current research concentrates on finding means for improving cooperation between major multilateral environmental agreements based on an interlinkages approach. He works and publishes on issues related to climate change, biodiversity, biotechnology policy, and trade and environment. He is Rapporteur of the International Law Association's Committee on the International Law of Sustainable Development. He is a lecturer in Public International Law at the University of Sheffield, UK, and the departmental co-ordinator of the LLB European, Comparative and International Law Degree. He was formerly a lecturer at the University of Reading. Dr. French's main research interests are public international law, international environmental law and the legal implications of sustainable development. He has written numerous articles on the above topics and is currently writing a book on the legal response to sustainable development for Manchester University Press. He is a member of the International Law Association British Branch Committee on International Environmental Law. **Prof. Hélène Trudeau**, LL.B (Montréal), LL.M. (Laval), D.E.A (Bordeaux I, France), est 'Senior Legal Research Fellow' du CDIDD. Elle est membre du Barreau du Québec depuis 1986, professeure agrégée à la Faculté de droit de l'Université de Montréal et chercheure associée au Centre de recherche en droit public de l'Université de Montréal, vice-doyenne aux études de premier cycle, Faculté de droit, Université de Montréal, 1998-1999, et responsable scientifique du Pôle environnement du Centre d'études et de recherches internationales de l'Université de Montréal (CÉRIUM) depuis 2004. Prof. Hélène Trudeau enseigne aux premier, deuxième et troisième cycles universitaires dans le domaine du droit de l'environnement. Elle dirige les travaux de plusieurs étudiants de maîtrise et de doctorat. Prof. Hélène Trudeau est bénéficiaire de plusieurs subventions de recherche portant sur la protection de la biodiversité dans le contexte de l'introduction des OGM dans le secteur agro-alimentaire, l'application du principe de précaution en droit international et au Canada, la réglementation des substances toxiques, les relations entre la protection de l'environnement et le commerce international. Elle dirige depuis 2002 un réseau de chercheurs de l'Agence universitaire francophone en droit de l'environnement comprenant des membres africains, européens et canadiens et travaillant sur la mise en application du Protocole de Cartagena. Ses publications les plus récentes portent sur l'intégration du Protocole de Kyoto dans le contexte constitutionnel canadien, les développements récents dans le dossier des OGM au Canada et sur la scène internationale, la prise en compte des principes de droit de l'environnement au Canada et le droit à un environnement sain.

**Prof. Richard Janda**, LL.M. (Columbia), B.C.L. (McGill), LL.B. (McGill), B.A. (Toronto), is a Senior Legal Research Fellow with the CISDL, concentrating on research related to corporate accountability, and climate change law. He also teaches business associations, administrative law, competition law, economic regulation, and air transport regulation. He was Law Clerk to Justices Le Dain and Cory of the Supreme Court of Canada and is a past Director of the Centre for the Study of Regulated Industries at McGill. His main current research areas are the legal basis of domestic and global corporate social responsibility and the regulatory regimes governing domestic and global public goods. Apart from his academic contributions, has been involved in work for the WTO, ICAO, OECD, the World Bank, a number of Canadian public agencies as well as work in a number of developing countries. He has served as an Associate Professor, McGill University Faculty of Law, since 1997, he is a Resident Member of the Institutes of Comparative Law and Air and Space Law at McGill University, he is a Member of the Editorial Board, *Annals of Air and Space Law*, since 1993, he is a Member, Advisory Board, *International Journal of Telecommunications Law and Policy*, he was Director, Centre for the Study of Regulated Industries, McGill University, from 1994 – 1999.

**Dr. Markus W. Gehring** (Germany) LL.M (Yale), Ph.D. Law (Hamburg) is Lead Counsel for Sustainable International Trade, Investment and Competition Law with the CISDL. He leads the CISDL delegation in WTO Ministerial Meetings, including in Doha, Qatar (2001), Cancun, Mexico (2003), and Hong Kong, China (2005). He is a Lecturer in Public International Law, WTO Law and EU Law for Cambridge University (Robinson College), and a member of the Concerted Action on Trade and Environment (CATE) European research initiative, funded by the European Commission. He served as a tutor of Public International Law at the Oxford University Faculty of Law, a legal researcher with Prof. Vaughan Lowe at All Souls College, Oxford University, and a Legal Fellow for the International Centre for Trade and Sustainable Development in Geneva, Switzerland, and editor of their legal column in the BRIDGES Journal. He also taught German Constitutional

and Administrative Law at the Faculty of Law, University of Hamburg, Germany. Dr. Gehring was Walter Oberreit Fellow, and is now candidate for his second Ph.D, a J.S.D. in European and Comparative Constitutional Law, at Yale Law School. He also studied at the Universidad de Deusto in Bilbao, Spain, where he specialised in International and European Law, and at the University of Hamburg. **Marie-Claire Cordonier Segger**, (Canada / U.K. / Switzerland), MEM (Yale), B.C.L. & LL.B. (McGill), B.A. Hons (Carl) is Director of the Centre for International Sustainable Development Law (CISDL). She lectures in law for the International Development Law Organisation, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean and other institutions. With Ashfaq Khalfan, she authored *Sustainable Development Law: Principles, Practices and Prospects* (Oxford University Press, 2004), with former Vice-President of the International Court of Justice, Judge C. G. Weeramantry, she edited *Sustainable Justice: Reconciling Economic, Social and Environmental Law* (Martinus Nijhoff, 2004), and with Dr. Markus Gehring, she edited *Sustainable Developments in World Trade Law* (Kluwer Law International, 2004). She is also director of a joint UNEP, International Institute for Sustainable Development and CISDL Americas project, where she chairs a hemispheric research consortium and was lead author of four books on regional trade and sustainable development issues. A member of the International Law Association’s (ILA) Committee on International Law on Sustainable Development, she chairs a joint CISDL – ILA – IDLO Partnership on International Law for Sustainable Development. Ms. Cordonier Segger has served as an editor on the *Revue Québécoise de Droit International*, on the Board of Directors for the Canadian Environment Network, and on several Canadian delegations to the United Nations. She has been twice appointed an AVINA Fellow, a Visiting Scholar at the Lauterpacht Research Centre for International Law at Cambridge University, and Associate Fellow at the Royal Institute of International Affairs (Sustainable Development Programme). A British Chevening Scholar, she holds a SSHRC Fellowship for International Law at Oxford University Faculty of Law (Exeter College). She is fluent in English, French and Spanish, with a notion of Portuguese and German.
